

Odiham Society plans to celebrate 800 years since the Magna Carta.

A very informative and entertaining talk was given to us at our March 20th meeting by the Chairman of The Odiham Society, Mr John Champion.

The first part of his talk was about life 800 years ago when King John used to visit Odiham, stopping there as a half-way point on his regular travels on horseback between Winchester and Windsor. He had finished building Odiham Castle in 1212, the year his daughter Eleanor was born, and three years before the Magna Carta was signed at Runnymede. He gave the castle to Eleanor when she was 21, two years before she married



Simon de Montfort. Parts of the building are still there, looking like this. John then went on to describe the 5 plans that are now being made by people in Odiham to celebrate the events and to encourage other nearby towns and villages to take part.

- 1. There is to be an Embroidery Exhibition including a 6-ft square embroidery showing 800 key historical facts, the work of 50-60 local stitchers, now in course of preparation.
- 2. Between 16th and 25th May 2015 there will be a Magna Carta Festival in Odiham, with concerts, morris dancing, clog-dancing, mediaeval archery, flower festival, canal-boat rally, mediaeval markets and lots of period costumes.
- 3. A 2-day 'Magna Carta Journey' is to take place on 6th-7th June from Odiham along 40 miles of canal to Weybridge.
- 4. On Sunday 14th June plans are being made for church bells to be rung along a line from Odiham to Wraysbury and Windsor, the day finishing with a 3pm "Liber Tea" at Odiham parish church.
- 5. There will be various 'Trails' described and followed, centering on Art-trails, Cider-trails, Aletrails etc.

The whole celebration will focus on Commemorating, Involving, Welcoming, Informing, Educating, Discovering and Enjoying. And it is hoped that other local villages and communities will catch the spirit and join in.

YATELEY HALL - WHAT NEXT?

A planning application has been submitted for Yateley Hall to change its use from offices to a Nursing Home. The proposal is to create single-room living accommodation with en suite facilities for 38 residents.

While the Society welcomes any long term sustainable use for this Grade II* listed building, we cannot give unconditional support, or accept that the historic features of the building have to undergo permanent damage to achieve that use. We are also concerned over the matter of long term sustainability of the building if used as a Nursing Home bearing in mind the high maintenance costs attached to listed buildings.

ANGRY RESIDENTS AT PLANNING MEETING

On the 17th March we attended a planning meeting at the Basingstoke Country Hotel which was arranged by the Hook Action Against Over Development Group. It was quite an occasion, with about 300 people squashed into the Woodland Suite with many standing and some sitting in the aisle.

The meeting was hosted by local MP James Arbuthnott supported by Stephen Parker Deputy Leader of Hart Council, Ranil Jayawardena (Tory candidate at the next election) and Maria Miller MP for Basingstoke. The meeting gave residents the opportunity to quiz their elected members over the unacceptable over development in Hook/Hart which has been driven by the failure of the council to produce an approved Core Strategy.

There were no magic solutions provided but the main theme that came out of the lively Q & A session was the need for the existing local plan to remain in place until the new emerging local plan is produced. This would be later this year according to Stephen Parker. James said he has had discussions with the Chief Whip about further government changes over this issue. He also committed himself to try and arrange a further meeting with planning minister Nick Boles in attendance to address residents concern.
