### **Yateley Common**

It has happened at last. After all the discussions that we have had over the past two years, Hampshire County Council has made a formal application to the Secretary of State to fence parts of Yateley Common in order to use grazing animals as part of the maintenance strategy.

The details of the fencing application are available to view in Yateley Library. The next stage should be the appointment of the inspector and the arrangement of a public meeting.

## MINUTES OF THE YATELEY, COVE AND HAWLEY CHARITIES 1886-1909

I have in my house (though not in my possession as they belong to The Yateley Society) photocopies of the Minutes of the meetings of the Trustees of these Charities. There are 35 pages, which sounds daunting but in fact there is not so very much on a page as they are of course handwritten and mainly rather spread out.

Most of the hand-writing, however, is in that urgent, steeply sloping Victorian style that needs concentration on the part of today's reader.

Dipping in here and there I found familiar names amongst the Trustees: F.H.Fitzroy of Frogmore Park, Dr John Mills. G.Holt Stilwell, and a number of farmers - Thomas Ellis who failed to attend for two years and so was replaced; George Prier who had a fruit farm in Darby Green and after whom Priors Lane was misnamed: F.W.Cobbett of Cobbetts Lane; and L.D.Kelsey who owned pieces of land in various parts of Yateley and Darby Green but had built himself a fine new house in Blackwater and so was representing Hawley. Replacements later included Captain Masterman RN; Yateley's master butcher, John Hills; and Admiral Gibson from Blackwater whose wife was the daughter of Bishop Sumner of Winchester. (John Mills's diary records the days that his wife shared painting lessons with Mrs Gibson.)

The Trustees always included at least two clergy. For many years there was the Reverend J.I.P.Wyatt of Hawley, while the Reverend C.D.Stooks of Yateley was elected Honorary Clerk of the Committee in 1886 and continued as such for 19 years. The Reverend John Beardall who succeeded him as vicar of St Peter's also took on his duties as Trustee and Honorary Clerk for the last few years of the Committee. (His 20th century hand is encouragingly legible.) Some of these charities had been founded two or three centuries earlier, and some were shared with Sandhurst so on

occasions a Sandhurst Trustee would be present. One was Dr William Russell who had built for himself and his family and his patients the huge mansion that is now Eagle House School.

Amongst the pages of Minutes I came across an estimate dated November 1906 from the builder Henry Bunch for repairing, repainting and relettering the Simmonds graves in St Peter's churchyard - for £4-17-6. This clearly should have been done earlier; money had been left for the purpose by Jacob Simmonds who died in 1843. Any surplus income was to have gone to the poor of Yateley, but if the graves had been neglected it should go to the poor of Sandhurst. The Trustees seemed a little disconcerted at what might have been their negligence and they accepted the estimate. The graves lie on the left of the footpath that slants to the left as you enter the churchyard. There are five of them side by side and a low white fence surrounds them all. Some twenty or thirty years ago The Yateley Society paid to have them restored but today they are in a desperately poor condition again with much of the woodwork completely rotten.

I think some interesting research could be pursued with these pages, and if any member would like to consider it, please let me know. A pleasant ploy for Lent perhaps. I also have photocopies of Yateley parish magazines from the first one in March 1878 to November 1880. I'd be glad to pass these on to anyone who is interested.

#### **Hawley Park Farm**

Applications for 126 houses and the creation of a large SANG (Suitable Alternative Greenspace) in Hawley have been approved by Hart District Council. However because of fierce local opposition Sir Gerald Howarth MP has requested that the Secretary of State call-in the application for his own decision. Because Hawley is outside the Society's charitable "area of benefit" we have not been directly involved. However we do await developments with great interest because the principles involved may well impact on our own "Heritage Assets". Although Hart claim the huge new SANG is supposed to enable new development in Surrey Heath and Rushmoor it could well end up just enabling more development in Hart.

#### WW1 Exhibition for 2015

The Society's 2014 exhibition has been at Yateley Manor School until this half term. Meanwhile the exhibition team is busy researching Yateley in 1915 for this year's exhibition. It is hoped that this can be mounted this September. The roller banner displays used for the first time last year were very well received, and proved especially popular, and useful, when the exhibition was displayed in schools. So we would like to create another six banner displays this year covering another six different topics. However we shall need a grant to be able to continue to finance them, or a massive amount of new member subscriptions. We have teams working on both.... #### **Scarlet Fever**

I see that NEHHAS has a project going on epidemics. Whilst looking for some fillers I found (in the vicar's New Year 1882 sermon, quoted in the Feb parish magazine):

"And first I think we have, my brethren, to thank God for giving us a year of health,—there has been no serious epidemic compared with the alarming one which visited us last year, of scarlet fever.

"The burial register reached 17, against 27 last year, out of which seventeen two deaths occurred in other parishes"
