#### HART'S GREAT OUTDOORS

In October, Tim Ackroyd, well-known to stalwart members of the Society's Conservation team, gave a most interesting and heartening illustrated talk about Hart's Countryside Service, the rangers, and the sites they manage across the District. There are nine local nature reserves with four main sites: Fleet Pond, Hazeley Heath Common (South), Odiham Common and Elvetham Heath Nature Reserve. With diverse habitats and dependant species, each site needs tailored management. The team of four multi-skilled rangers works on all sites, but each is responsible for one site in particular. Tim has been responsible for all the small sites, which include our Royal Oak Valley, Phoenix Green Common, Basingbourne Heath, Fleet and Oakley Woods, Fleet.

The four major sites are managed under Higher Level Stewardship schemes, where government funding matches Hart's contribution to the management of the character species of each area. Fleet Pond, the largest freshwater lake in Hampshire, covers about half of the 135 acres of the reserve. From Saxon times The Pond or 'Fugelmere' was a notable fish farm, so the modern rangers' work on this SSSI has to concentrate on reed scything the margins, grazing with a mix of Shetland ponies and heritage cattle and managing the marsh and woodland to support the 180 breeds of bird, 26 types of butterfly, 21 species of dragonfly and 400 wild flowers, many of them nationally and internationally important. The Fleet Pond Society, founded in 1976 (long before the District Council was alive to the value of this area) provides constant workparties and financial support to the reserve.

Hazeley Heath is a noted Silver Studded Blue butterfly site and this summer clouds of them could be seen by visitors to this SSSI, which is also part of the heathland Special Protection Area of the Thames Basin. Here the grazing cattle can be moved over the area using temporary electric fencing. And because the heathland was deeply scarred by MoD tank tracks, the more drastic-seeming technique of mechanical scraping is used to help release buried heather seeds and so rejuvenate the heathland.

At Odiham Common there are abundant fungi and rich meadow grasses. It is home to the only colony of the Forester moth in Hampshire and also has rare spiders, such as the wasp spider. Here the soil is neutral and the wood pasture requires careful management of the crucial 10 metre band along its woodland edges.

Yateley's Royal Oak Valley receives no funding, just the devoted attentions of volunteers under the guidance of the Hart ranger. The story of 'our' valley is as unique as any of Hart's countryside sites and deserves its own telling. The rangers conduct advertised walks in all areas but you should really explore Hart's countryside this autumn and winter for yourselves. ## Weddings

Mr. H. Hilton during his 40 years as Parish Clerk must have been able to record many funny little stories in connection with weddings, etc. Here are two he told me:-

"The parties came from Cove, and it appears the young man lived at home with his parents and to insure having plenty of food for the wedding, killed the pig. The young man had for his breakfast what is known as a pig's hock, having picked the bone he wrapped it up and put it into his pocket, remarking to his bride elect who was breakfasting with him, "I will put this in my pocket and when it comes to the words "with this ring I thee wed" I shall take it out and say "with this bone I'll break your head," and of course when they got to that they both burst out laughing, this was a great deal too much for the old Vicar<sup>1</sup>, he closed the book and said, "I think you had better come again another day for me to complete the ceremony. I don't think you understand what a solemn obligation you are entering into," with that he turned round and went into the vestry. Mr. Hilton said it was the hardest job he ever had in his life to get him to return and finish the Service, which he did eventually, but he read the riot act to them very severely afterwards. The Bride went down the Church crying bitterly, and the young man looked very serious, as though he felt he ought to cry too. Mr. Hilton followed them out into the Church Porch and asked them what it was all about, they told him the story as I have told you, he also gave them a bit of good advice and sent them home."

This story concerned two Yateley people<sup>2</sup>:-

"The bride was a very, very nervous person and when she had to repeat the words "I Mary, take thee John, etc.," she could not get the words out, so the young man put his arm round her waist and said very appealingly, "Now my dear, do say it!" Mr. Stooks<sup>3</sup>, who could always see the humorous side of things, took no notice.

### Sports.

Cricket in the Parish was always well supported, we could always raise a good eleven. The late Mr. Henry Bunch<sup>4</sup> was a great supporter and a good player, he used to bowl round-arm bowling. The Paices<sup>5</sup> were also good. The late Mr. Henry Hilton<sup>6</sup> was also a most enthusiastic cricketer and played very late in life, he was a most tantalizing underhand bowler, I have seen him win a match when it seemed we had lost, often when the bowlers could not part the batsmen I have seen the captain put Mr. Hilton on, his bowling would be slower and the batsmen could not wait for them, if they did strike the ball it was alright, but if they missed it they were out at once as he was always dead on the wicket. I remember once he got four men out with five balls and won the match.

This suggests this happened during the incumbancy of Mr Lewin, and while Henry Hilton was parish clerk. The identity of the couple is unknown – many Cove couples continued to be married at Yateley after the new parish church of St John was built at Cove.
