

ACCESS IMPROVEMENTS

Last winter access in three sections of the Blackwater Valley were improved thanks to a grant from Natural England through Defra's Aggregates Levy Sustainability Fund (ALSF). The project involved upgrading two sections of the Valley's footpath network - one in Farnham, adjacent to the Shepherd & Flock roundabout, the other along the BV Path in Farnborough just north of North Camp station - resurfacing a stretch of bridleway adjacent to Moor Green Lakes and buying new machinery that will help improve maintenance of the Valley's paths in future. In total the project was worth over £70,000 with ALSF contributing £54,000, 75% of the total cost. The remaining 25% was match funded by Rushmoor Borough Council, Wokingham District Council, Surrey County Council, the Blackwater Valley Countryside Trust and minerals extraction company CEMEX, with a significant contribution also being made through volunteer work.

ON THE HEDGE

They say actions speak louder than words, so we're delighted to be able to support a traditional countryside craft: hedgelaying. This type of management has a positive impact on the area's landscape, whilst being best practise for nature conservation. So far three sections of hedging in the southern part of the Valley have been laid in this way, thus contributing to Surrey's new Road Verge Habitat Action Plan (HAP) with more on the agenda. Much of the work has been done by the Surrey Hedgelaying Group.







OUR BIG 30!

The summer has been a busy one with our special anniversary roadshow going to events in all areas of the Valley. Designed to inform and educate local residents about who we are and what we do, through our information boards, whilst developing the interest of children to both wildlife and the Blackwater Valley, the roadshow has been very successful.



NEW VOLUNTEER GROUP

If you live anywhere in the area of Southwood Woodland, Farnborough you might like to consider joining the new volunteer group we've set up there.

The wood is owned by Rushmoor Borough Council who are improving the area to make it more accessible for people to use. A series of footpaths have already been developed but this is only the first element of a major improvement scheme to balance the requirements of wildlife and amenity to provide a valuable natural resource for the community.

We are working in partnership with Rushmoor Borough Council to establish the local community group to look after the site, which is designated a Site of Importance for Nature Conservation (SINC). The group meets on the fourth Sunday of every month. If you're interested ring our Ranger Stuart Croft at BVCP for more details.

SIMPLY GRAZING

Grazing is a traditional way of meadow management and last November (2008) two Highland cattle, Ruby and Kayla, were introduced to the site at Snaky Lane in Ash. They remained there until February, chomping their way through the rough grass, scrub and bramble.

The cattle were checked daily by a dedicated rota of 'lookers' and were perfectly happy despite the heavy snow we had in February. They left in February but are due to return later this year.

Last year the Snaky Lane Community Wildlife Group were awarded a grant of £9,125, by the BBC Breathing Places. This covered the cost of installing stock-proof fencing around part of the site to enable the cattle to graze safely.

IN GOOD COMPANY

This summer we've been hosting a great number of corporate and local community conservation days. Companies who have come out to help us carry out tasks – from hay raking and scrub clearance to coppicing and fence building – include Eli Lilly, the Environment Agency and 3M. We welcome the opportunity to introduce what are normally office workers to conservation work – although why does everyone want to come out in the summer!

STAFF CHANGES
